#### WHAT MENTAL HEALTH FIRST AID COVERS

- Common signs and symptoms of mental health challenges in this age group, including anxiety, depression, eating disorders and attention deficit hyperactive disorder (ADHD).
- · Common signs and symptoms of substance use challenges.
- How to interact with a child or adolescent in crisis.
- · How to connect the youth with help.
- Expanded content on trauma, substance use, self-care and the impact of social media and bullying.

Learn how to respond with the Mental Health First Aid Action Plan (ALGEE):

- A ssess for risk of suicide or harm.
- isten nonjudgmentally.
- G ive reassurance and information.
- ncourage appropriate professional help.
- ncourage self-help and other support strategies.
